
NURSERY

From painting pictures of themselves to making pizza and home and in school, planting sunflower seed to enjoying our very own Festival it has been an exciting and fun filled year. What an exciting ride it has been! We are so proud of them all!



YEAR 1

This term 1LH have been doing lots of writing. We have been writing about 'Snail and the Whale' by Julia Donaldson. Our favourite part of the book was when the snail writes on the blackboard saying "Save the Whale!"

We have been learning all about money in Maths. We know all the coins and notes. Some of us recognised them from our pocket money and money jars. Watch out Mums and Dads!

We have loved using the BeeBots in Computing. We wrote algorithms and learnt how to debug the mistakes we had made. It was so much fun! In Art we went outdoors to collect natural materials before using them to make sculptures and patterns. We used Andy Goldsworthy's artwork to inspire us and help us with ideas.



YEAR 2

This term has been one of our favourites! We enjoyed designing and making our very own alien hand puppets. We learned how to do both an overstitch and a running stitch. The mini beast hunt, in our playground, was super fun because we found ants, bees, worms and spiders. We also enjoyed getting outside with our friends. We particularly loved the Magic Finger book because we were able to write a persuasive letter to Mr. Gregg explaining how horrible hunting is! Before the letter, we enjoyed having a class debate and explained our reasons for and against hunting; we were very enthusiastic. Well- being week was fantastic as we loved being able to drop everything and read. Sketching our own Stitch character was our favourite part!

Finally, we finished our capacity topic off outside, where we measured the size of different puddles. We found out that 1000ml has the biggest puddle and 500ml was a lot smaller.



YEAR 3

We've had lots of fun learning about fractions. We were so good at it! We took our learning outside too to complete a fraction quiz hunt! We've also been practicing our times tables skills on TT Rockstars, battling the other class in a times tables race. We think the other class won first time, but we battled back the next week and won! In English we really enjoyed reading the book 'The Iron Man' and writing our own version called 'The Bronze Man'.

We created new characters based on those in the book and uplevelled our work using interesting vocabulary and fronted adverbials. We've also learnt about 'Plastic pollution' and wrote a report about the threat this poses to our oceans. We learnt about the shocking amount of plastic in our seas that marine life are eating and dying from. We wrote about the importance of 'reducing, reusing and recycling' and also how we can all do our bit to help.

In History we learnt all about Skara Brae, a Stone Age settlement on an Orkney island and the way of prehistoric life there. We also combined art with history when we completed our own Paleolithic cave drawings. We were fascinated to learn about Stone Henge. It is amazing how they built it! We can now talk about the changes between the different Stone Age eras.

In Computing, we've had fun coding characters in games to make them do things, such as making the genie come out of the lamp in this activity,

We've been on a learning walk to find out about our local area and its human and physical features. We focused on local services, particularly the local sweet shop!



During 'Refugee week' we read a book called 'The Journey', learning about people who have to leave their country because it's no longer safe there. We realised that these are very special people who we need to look after and celebrate. We made our own birds because in the same way that birds migrate to find a better, safer life, so do refugees.



During 'Wellness week', each day had a different theme. On art day, we created a nature collage, on music day we started learning a song called 'Bring us together' and we are signing the lyrics as we sing. On PE day we played dodge ball.

YEAR 4

Year 4 have had a great summer term. Here are some of the children's highlights...
