Back in September we were delighted to welcome Councillor Mary Rasmussen, the new Lord Mayor of Liverpool, to our school.



Councillor Mary Rasmussen was raised in Chapel Road, Garston, the third child of ten to Thomas and Theresa Gibbons. Thomas and Theresa came to Liverpool from County Mayo, Ireland and made the city their home after trying Glasgow and London. They always told their children it was the best decision they ever made. Mary echoes their sentiments.

Mary was educated at St Francis of Assisi Primary School and then at Blessed John Almond School for her secondary education. Later in life, Mary completed an access university course, but an opportunity to work with people who were long-term unemployed meant that higher education was put on the back burner.

Mary was first elected to represent the Speke/Garston Ward in 2007 and has held numerous positions on the council. She has also been the Chair of the Labour Group and was also the first woman in Liverpool to occupy the Chief Whip role.

Mary believes that Liverpool is the best, because its people are, quite simply, the best.

During her visit to our school, Councillor Rasmussen went on a tour around each class in the school. She was blown away by the friendly welcome she was given in each class and was astounded by the thought provoking questions that were asked by the children, as well as how respectful the children were.

As a school we wish Councillor Rasmussen well as she embarks on her year as Lord Mayor of Liverpool and we look forward to her visiting the school again in the not-too-distant future.

"Yes, we got him" both said so excitedly. Did you really think that Sophia and Steve wouldn't know what to do with him! Well, if you did, you were wrong.






The Christmas Pig – By Tess Burns, year 6

The plethora of activities brilliantly provided by the School Sports' Partnerships, numerous coaches and even Joe Wicks showed how important physical activity is to the children, and more importantly, how much the children enjoy it.

St Austin's year 5 and 6 cross country team were enthusiastically welcomed back in September this year and have been totally committed to training weekly with Mrs O'Shea. They have worked extremely hard every Monday and Tuesday morning before their school day even begun showing total commitment and determination for the Cross Country League Races. They courageously ran through the freezing wind with Esme finishing in 13th position with a time of 8.27 and Elsie finishing 39th with a timing of 9.09.
