The event was organised by Knotty Ash, who have a Deaf Resource Base within their school, and their aim was to raise awareness for bullying and empowering children to be their authentic selves.

The children performed the songs 'No Matter What' and 'This is Me' and were joined in the audience by Miss England, Anti-bullying Alliance, The Mayor of Liverpool and Julia Baird (John Lennon's sister).

European Day of Languages 2022

Our International lead teacher Miss Docherty takes us through the events of another successful European Day of Languages

Our theme for this year's 'European Day of Languages' developed our pupils' knowledge and appreciation of the diversity of European languages in a fun and engaging way.

Nursery, EYFS and KS1 children went on a language treasure hunt, finding simple phrases of different European languages and matching them to the correct flag. They, also, took a lighthearted look at how animal sounds are represented in different European languages.

KS2 children became language 'secret agents' for the day, completing a series of challenges which explored various European languages whilst developing their language skills. Activities were varied and ranged from counting to 10 in three different languages to rapping in a European language. Other activities involved studying the etymology of some European languages , including Greek and English and studying the origins of our alphabet from other European alphabets.

Our celebration of this day forms an integral part of our international dimension enabling St Austin's pupils from nursery to year 6 to grow in their knowledge and appreciation of diverse languages and cultures, equipping them with vital skills as future global citizens.



Recently, ESME in year 6 represented Liverpool at The British Cross Country Challenge. Here is her Report on why Cross-Country is so important, with a run-down of how the season has gone for the St Austin's Cross Country Team so far...

Cross country is a nationally renowned sport which is a healthy form of exercise. In Liverpool, some primary schools offer cross country running clubs for their pupils and enter teams to compete in the Liverpool Primary Cross Country races. Primary schools compete from all over Liverpool city. These races are roughly a mile in distance. The races take place in different parks around Liverpool and mainly it is years 5 and 6 pupils that take part.

Each school gains points if the pupils are among the top ten finishers in each race. At the end of the season three school are awarded the first, second and third place in the Liverpool Primary Schools champion league. St Austin's girls team came 2nd at the end of the season last year.

This season, the first race was supposed to be in Croxteth Park but was delayed to later in the year due to bad weather. The second race was in Newsham Park, the third was in Stanley Park and the fourth was in Clarke Gardens which was very hard and hilly. Then we did Croxteth which as I have told you was delayed and happened before the new year. During the races the organisers were timing the top twenty finishers. From St Austin's, I had great race times and was chosen to be on the Liverpool team, as was Elsie (Year 6) and Henry (Year 5).
