My connection with the school goes back a long way. I attended the school in Year 5 and 6 when Miss Whittaker was the Headteacher. In those days, there were outside toilets in the playground and children were given the cane if they behaved badly. They were also given lines to write as a punishment. A child might have to write, "I must not forget my homework." two hundred times.

My three daughters also came to St. Austin's and I was elected as a Parent Governor when my eldest daughter was about 8 years old. I very much enjoyed being a Parent Governor. It was so interesting seeing what went on behind the scenes.

When my term was up, I was asked to be a Foundation Governor and I've been one ever since. I can't remember how long I've been Chair but it's probably about six or seven years.

Governors have responsibility for appointing the Headteacher and checking that their job is done properly. We also have a duty to uphold the Catholic ethos of the school and ensure that all the children are happy and safe. Each governor has responsibility for different curriculum areas, and mine is for SEND and maths. I have regular meetings with Mrs Hughes and Mrs Doyle so I can keep up to date.

During the recent Ofsted inspection, the inspector asked me a lot of questions about SEND and thanks to Mrs Hughes, I could answer them all.

Because I'm retired now, I'm able to have more contact with the children in school and it's a pleasure to help out on educational visits from time to time.

The other day, someone gave me a Christmas card with a label on the envelope. The label said, "Keep Christ in Christmas". Among all the celebrations and festivities, which we associate with Christmas, we should remember that it is a feast of faith in the first place. We are welcoming, and giving thanks for, the birth of Jesus the Saviour of the world. He is the reason for the joy we feel at this season, and for the peace and goodwill, which flourish at this time of year.

We can keep Christ in Christmas by coming to church for one of the Christmas Masses. At St. Francis of Assisi in Garston, we will be having three Masses: 7.00 pm on Christmas Eve, 12.00 midnight (with carols at 11.30 pm) and 10.00 am on Christmas Eve.

In our homes, we can maintain a focus on Jesus by putting up a Christmas crib and gathering around it to say prayers. This is a significant year for the Christmas crib, as the first ever crib was assembled by St. Francis of Assisi (the patron of our church) on Christmas Eve in 1223. Exactly eight hundred years ago.

If you would like the Baby Jesus figure from your crib to be blessed before Christmas, you can bring it to church this weekend (16/17 December), when crib figures will be blessed at the end of the 6pm Mass on Saturday and the 9.30 and 11.15 Masses on Sunday.

I wish you and all your family a happy, blessed and holy Christmas, with Christ at its heart and its centre.





5. Then, the next day, take it out of the clay.









European Day of Languages

In September, we celebrated 'European Day of Languages' with the theme 'The language of food'.

Encounters with iconic international dishes and regional specialities often provide us with our first opportunities to expand our language vocabulary and deepen cultural understanding. Learning about the food of a country helps us to understand aspects of its life, society, climate and culture. All of these and more were explored during our day's celebration of world languages and cultures.



Amongst the dishes they tried, Year 1 enjoyed tasting the typical Portuguese cake 'pastel de nata' and spotted the language similarities between Portuguese and Spanish.



Pachi enjoyed helping Year 2 learn about some typical dishes from her home country of Colombia, with its tropical climate, avocados and exotic fruits grow well there, so children made guacamole and 'salpicon', a typical drink using a variety of juices and fruits.



Year 3 travelled to the Middle East, designing menus in Arabic for some typical middle eastern dishes. After making our own flat bread and falafels, the children enjoyed these in a typical *mezze* with olives, hummus, pomegranates and chickpeas.



After taking part in Greek dancing, Year 4 explored the Greek alphabet, comparing and contrasting it with the alphabet we use, then learnt the words of some well-known Greek dishes, which they then tasted.



As Year 5 are currently learning Mandarin as well as Spanish, they explored the language, food and culture of China. They took part in a cookery class to make their own spring rolls.



Year 6 had a truly multicultural day celebrating not one but three international cultures and cuisines: Brazil, Romania and Poland. Our Year 6 international ambassadors said that learning about and tasting food from different countries, especially the polish bagels and Brazilian pancakes was wonderful!


Sports, sports, sports...
